Women in Business Huge Success!



The first session of the Chamber's Women in Business program was a tremendous success according to the 60+ women, representing many segments of the Chamber membership, who attended.

The new Multi-Purpose Room at the TCAT was a perfect location and newly named President of TCAT, Susie Cox was a gracious host and informative speaker as she shared information about TCAT Morristown with the group. Everyone was excited to congratulate Cox on her appointment. She will assume the role on May 1.

The Women in Business program was the brainchild of Chamber Vice President Leigh Sempkowski of South Marketing Group. She had been mulling over how and when to approach the Chamber about implementing the program for several years and 2022 seemed the perfect time as Dr. Tony Miksa, 2022 Chamber President wanted his year to focus on inclusion and diversity. Sempkowski presented the idea to the Chamber Executive Committee and Board early this year and a team of Board members volunteered to serve as the steering committee. Kristina Veit, Susie Cox, Rhonda Krenzer and Mickey Brabson joined Sempkowski in the planning of the program. Jessica Rich of HomeTrust Bank approached the Chamber about being a sponsoring partner and things took off from there.

Response to the announcement of the program was swift and enthusiastic. As of the first session, sixty-six women had registered to participate. Calls continue to come it to the Chamber from others interested in joining the group. Those joining for the remainder will pay a pro-rated fee which includes breakfasts and programs, held on the first Friday of each month through December. All sessions will be held at TCAT.

Due to the large number of candidates running in the primary election on May 3 (early voting runs April 13 –28, the Chamber has elected to utilize a different format to help educate voters. Rather than hold a candidate forum where all candidates facing opposition have an opportunity to speak to an audience, this year the Chamber is hosting a "Candidate Meet & Greet". ALL candidates on the ballot in both the Republican & Democratic primaries have been invited to participate in the event at Rose Center. The general public is also invited to attend. They will be able to mingle with the candidates and talk with them "one-on-one" about the issues of interest to them.

In addition to the Meet & Greet, the Chamber is also partnering with the Citizen Tribune to feature candidates facing primary opposition. These candidates will be profiled in the *Tribune* between now and the beginning of early voting. All the profiles will also be available for viewing on the Citizen Tribune's website (www.citizentribune.com) through the election on May 3.

The Chamber hopes to resume the "in-person" candidate forum format prior to the August General Election.

A Critical Decision: Choosing Someone to Lead Our School System

As our search for a new Director of Schools comes down to the finalists, it is important to know as a Chamber member why this decision is so important to business and industry in our community. This simple answer is workforce development, but as we dive a little deeper into that, you have to understand that this position is what drives the future of each and every youth in our community.

The 4 year college completion rate hovers around 35% and has changed little in the past decades which means 65% of our youth will need skills in excess of high school completion, and a school director drives this ambition for success. This drive of success is less about college but more about career readiness as college is merely a pathway toward a job and most people, if they know that there is a 65% chance of falling of the path, will choose the 65% route of success.

It is also important to see what our candidates view as success as to me, each individual child's success isn't determined by a standardized test or a grade of a C or above; their success is measured 10 -20 years after graduation. Are they self sustaining and a contributing member of a community. Unfortunately we love to measure the immediate results of memorization and fail to examine the long term effects of education's long term success. My most recent recount of my high school education is that I'm sure glad I learned about parallelograms instead of learning to do my taxes. It sure has come in handy this parallelogram season. This is a simple idea that bad or useless information in leads to wasted time and a lack of useful life skills coming out.

As you watch the candidates through this search for a new director of schools, picture who sets your child up best for future success whether it is in the courtroom, boardroom or behind a welding mask. Each student, regardless of the knowledge we pump into them, should be pushed to be the best version of themselves and as parents, educators and leaders, doing any less is doing a disservice to the student and our future workforce.


